• The number of patients who have absconded from units after being admitted for mental health care over the last five calendar years (2013,2014,2015,2016,2017)? Please break this down by year. For the purpose of this I am defining absconding to mean when a patient leaves the ward, hospital or an escort without prior agreement or consent from the clinical team.

2 (both on wards at time of death)

(Patient B - 0 incidents of self-harm; Patient H1 - 0 incidents of self-harm)

2015/16

2 (both on wards at time of death)

(Patient K - 0 incidents of self-harm; Patient S - 0 incidents of self-harm)

2016/17

4 (3 on wards at time of death, 1 on leave)

(Patient H2 – 21 incidents of self-harm; Patient O – 0 incidents of self-harm; Patient F – 21 incidents of self-harm; Patient C – 0 incidents of self-harm)

2017/18

Unable to report 2017/18 as no inquests are concluded and only the Coroner can determine if a person died by suicide.

Each of these incidents was investigated as a serious incident, and there was no reference to "duty of care" concerns.

• The number of inpatients who self-harmed while under NHS trust care over the last five years (2013,2014,2015,2016,2017)? Please break this down by year and, if possible, detail how many individual self-harm attempts there were per patient.

Please note we cannot provide the data before April 2016 for this question as the information is held in a legacy system and cannot be relied on.
